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North Carolina 2013 Legislative Strategy: DRAFT

Lay of the Land:

During the lay of the land conversation, we should reach consensus on the question, "Which Pat McCrory will come to Raleigh?" and identify opportunities in the environment of which our strategy should seek to take advantage.

Potential Assumptions:

- There will be few outright policy wins for progressives in this political environment.
- In most cases, the win can only be defined as mitigating the worst legislation.
- The most effective way to mitigate the worst legislation is to weaken our opponents' ability to govern by crippling their leaders (McCrory, Tillis, Berger, etc.).
- We must also present contrasting policy alternatives that resonate with North Carolinians.
- That work can only be done together, as part of a collective statewide strategy.

Potential Opportunities:

- Tension between the Governor and the legislature
- Tension between the House and the Senate (with the Senate having the advantage)
- Tension in Republican ranks—between moderate, business-minded Republicans and more ideological Republicans
- Tension between their base and their statewide political reality (e.g., changing demographics)
- Absolute power corrupts absolutely: overreach, ethical issues, arrogance, conflicts of interests
- McCrory is extremely thin-skinned.
- They have more money, but we have more people.
- Being out in the cold should create a willingness among progressives to work collaboratively.

Goal Setting: Ten and Two Years

We need to articulate a ten year vision, but we can't plan out how to achieve a ten year vision in two days. Instead, our focus here should be to plan out the next two years and gut check along the way to make sure that planning for the short term helps us get to our long term vision.

Potential Ten Year Vision

- Progressives have built a vibrant ground-up multi-racial organizing infrastructure.
- Progressives have a leadership development pipeline in place.
- Progressives own the issue environment.
- Progressives are prepared to influence the redistricting process in 2020.
- Underrepresented voters vote at same rate as they are present in the population

Potential Two Year Vision: Eviscerate, Mitigate, Litigate, Cogitate and Agitate ("Lose Forward")

- Eviscerate the leadership and weaken their ability to govern.
- Mitigate legislative attacks on progressive values and set up legal challenges.



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- Provide an alternative policy vision—what a progressive NC would look like.
- Build a base that eventually leads to a multi-racial ground up organizing structure.

Buckets of Work

These buckets of work need to be working well in order for us to meet our goals and take advantage of the opportunities we laid out in the lay of the land discussion. We should identify what these buckets are, where our existing organizations fit into them, and where we have gaps.

Potential Buckets of Work:

- Connection to progressive elected officials: our elected allies need an incomparable knowledge of procedure and insight from other minority caucuses to develop floor and committee strategy
- Research and tracking: full scale effort to educate citizens and hold legislators accountable that feeds content to our earned media and field people
- Relentless earned media efforts: operatives with relationships to statewide media and developed strategies for getting the message out in non-traditional ways
- Organizers who galvanize citizens: statewide presence that helps people see what's wrong and why; then empowers them through leadership development and civic engagement
- Policy development (think tanks): people who can articulate our vision but are careful to do so in a way that resonates with majority of North Carolinians
- Coordination and project management: people who can keep the trains running—meetings, coordination and communication between partners, follow up and accountability

Building Agreement on Shared Tactics

What types of tactics can we use to achieve our objectives in each of the buckets of work and how do they work together? Here are some ideas from which to work:

Progressive Elected Officials:

- Introduce bills that articulate our vision—complemented by a coordinated press strategy that includes press releases and mock committee hearings
- Organize a brain trust that can identify opportunity for procedural tricks, strategic amendments, direct action, etc.—consultants, electeds, former chiefs of staff (Rand, Basnight)
- Use wisdom from other states—invite the FL minority leader up to brief us, etc.
- Establish a weekly meeting with progressive caucus and progressive organizations: strategy and

Research and Tracking

- Polling that identifies the weaknesses of our opponents and highlights where our progressive vision:dovetails with public opinion
- Staff of video trackers follow the targets' every move (McCrory/Tillis) and also capture as much video of committee hearings as possible looking for opportunities to feed our overarching narrative (McCrory and the Legislature are out of control, for example)
- Pay to Play research: where can we see that policy is being unduly influenced by campaign



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Private investigators and investigative reporting: especially in the executive branch, focused on

- Pressure McCrory at every public event: PNC style visibility, audience questions at any town hall
- Track every campaign promise he made 4 years ago and in 2012 and slam him when he

Policy Development:

Develop a core group to identify policy objectives that articulate our vision: if we controlled the legislature, what would we introduce? And of that, which are in line with where NC actually is, or close to it? This group feeds this to electeds and the earned media folks

Coordination and Project Management:

- Write the work plan from our legislative retreat
- Establish and run productive meetings to move the agenda forward.
- Ensure that commitments are being met
- Ensure that the other five buckets are communicating and sharing information Help drive the fundraising

Key Messaging Points

According to the results of our recent survey¹, building upon the research we conducted back in July 2012, the key concepts of hard work, fairness, accountability, and personal responsibility continue to be fundamental points of emphasis, and there is a clear sense that hardworking taxpayers are getting the short end of the stick at the expense of big corporations and the wealthiest. Indeed, the overall message framework is summarized in the graphic below, and the message should always be focused around fairness and accountability.

Progressives want fairness and accountability so hardworking taxpayers who pay their fair share and play by the rules can get ahead.



This broad contrast should be applied to every single debate possible throughout the legislative session, including the specific issues of tax reform and online charter schools as well as against McCrory himself.

When it comes to the proposed tax reforms, certainly the final version of what is proposed has yet to be determined. Nonetheless, these plans should be framed around the notion of hardworking taxpayers paying more while businesses and wealthy individuals will pay less. In essence, these tax proposals will result in taxpayers paying more


Framing Opposition to the Proposed Tax Plans



¹ These findings are based on a survey of 500 likely November 2014 general election voters in North Carolina. Calling took place from January 29-February 2, 2013, and interviews were conducted by professional interviewers supervised by Myers Research | Strategic Services staff, with 30 percent of telephone respondents reached on a cell phone. This telephone base sample was augmented by an online oversample of 150 voters under the age of 30, and this oversample was weighted into the base. The data were stratified to reflect the projected geographical contribution to the total expected vote. The margin of error associated with these data at a 95 in 100 percent confidence level is +/- 4,4 percent. The margin of error for subgroups is

than their fair share while big corporations and the wealthiest are getting special breaks.

Framing Opposition to Conservative Education Policies



Seven-in-ten voters (71 percent) believe that funding for North Carolina public schools has gone down in the past few years and two thirds (63 percent) believe the state spends too little on K through 12 education today. And, certainly, these perceptions should be readily applied to McCrory and his allies in the legislature. Moreover, the proposed plans for online charter schools will mean that online, for-profit charter school entities will get

more tax dollars at the expense of kids, without having accountability - they do not have to provide buildings, lunches, or even face-to-face meetings between teachers and parents, yet they will be treated the same as local public schools.

Despite his winning the election, the jury is still out on McCrory, and now is the time for progressives to define him. In looking specifically at persuasion audiences, McCrory's giving pay raises to Cabinet officials (high-level government bureaucrats) while trying to cut benefits for those who are doing their best to try to work hard emerges as the most salient line of attack against him and fits well into this broader narrative.







SURVEY METHODOLOGY

Myers Research | Strategic Services, LLC designed and administered this blended methodology telephone/online survey conducted by professional interviewers. The survey reached 650 adults, 18 years or older, who indicated that they either voted or were too young or ineligible to vote in the 2010 election, and indicated that they were almost certain to, would probably, or the chances were 50-50 that they would vote in the election for U.S. Senate, Congress and other offices in November 2014. The survey was conducted January 29-February 2, 2013.

Telephone numbers were generated by a random selection of both voters with and without phone numbers from the voter file. Thirty percent of telephone respondents were reached on wireless phones. The sample was stratified by county. Quotas were assigned to reflect the expected contribution of these areas to the total vote in the general election. The data were weighted by geography, age, party registration and education to ensure an accurate reflection of the population. The sample size with these weights applied is 500. The telephone base sample was augmented by an online oversample of 150 voters under the age of 30. This oversample was weighted into the base.

In interpreting survey results, all sample surveys are subject to possible sampling error: that is, the results of a survey may differ from those which would be obtained if the entire population were interviewed. The size of the sampling error depends upon both the total number of respondents in the survey and the percentage distribution of responses to a particular question. For example, if a response to a given question to which all respondents answered was 50%, we could be 95% confident that the true percentage would fall within plus or minus 4.4% of this percentage or between 45.6% and 54.4%. The table below represents the estimated sampling error for different percentage distributions of responses.

Good evening North Carolina, I am House Democratic Minority Leader Larry Hall and I want to speak with you tonight about our ideas to move North Carolina forward.

We must, however, make sure that reform is not just a code word for continuing to cut more and more from our schools. Cutting funding for public education is wrong because it hurts our children's ability to succeed and compete for the jobs of the future.

In recent years Republicans have slashed teachers and increased class sizes. They have continually asked our teachers to do more with less. It's time to end this cycle, it's time to invest in our schools and our future by giving teachers the tools and resources they need to help our students succeed. We should treat our teachers like professionals and our students like our future.

Gov. McCrory supports bringing online charter schools to North Carolina. His plan lacks accountability and would allow out-of-state corporations to create online, for-profit virtual charter schools. These schools wouldn't have to provide school buildings, buses, lunches or face to face meetings between parents and teachers. Yet at the end of the day, they would receive the same amount of our tax dollars as our public schools. This is wrong. Democrats believe we must have more accountability and that we should keep North Carolina's education in the hands of North Carolinians.

For decades, North Carolina has been a leader in higher education. We built a world-class university system and a community college system that is second to none. Today's students, however, are faced with rising tuition costs and decreased financial aid. This current trend threatens middle class access to our colleges and universities. We call on Gov. McCrory to reverse this trend and make increasing middle class access to higher education a priority in his first budget.

We believe our state must give North Carolinians the government they deserve — an open and honest government that is accountable and respects the rights of all its citizens. We need to increase oversight and promote accountability in state government to ensure taxpayer money is spent wisely and efficiently. We need to reform ethics laws to ensure our government is accountable to the people and not to special interests. And we need to protect the right of all North Carolinians to participate in electing their leaders.

Our Democratic philosophy is this — everyone who pays their fair share, works hard and plays by the rules should have a fair shot at success. In the coming weeks and months, my Democratic colleagues and I will introduce legislation to accomplish the goals and uphold the values I have outlined tonight.

We stand ready to work with the Republican leadership to move North Carolina forward.
