


North Carolina Population (1790-2017)

Among the states, North Carolina had the 5th largest numeric increase since 2016. Only Texas (400,000), Florida (328,000), California (240,000), and Washington (125,000) gained more residents over the past year. With a growth rate of 1.1% since 2016, North Carolina continues to grow faster than the national average (0.7%), although it is not among the fastest-growing states. Between 2016 and 2017, North Carolina had the 12th highest growth rate.




Median Household Income (2016)

Annual Estimates of Components of Population Change (2010-2017)



Since 2010, North Carolina's population has grown by more than 737,000 residents, an increase of 7.7%. 64% of this growth was due to net in-migration. In the most recent year, North Carolina received an estimated 86,200 net in-migrants (74% of total population growth). This was the largest year of in-migration for the state since the 2010 Census and was more in-migrants than received by any other state except for Florida, Texas, or Washington. Most of these in-migrants were domestic migrants (66,000), meaning that they moved to North Carolina from other states.




North Carolina Economy: Employment Share by Industry vii

Growth of Service Providing Industries in North Carolina (2007-2016)





Total Nonfarm Jobs






Average Weekly Earnings of Employees on Private Nonfarm Payrolls in North Carolina and Neighboring States (January 2018)

GDP of North Carolina and Neighboring States (2017)



- The 2007-2017 average annual growth rate for North Carolina's real GDP is 1.1%; the average annual growth rate for the nation is 1.3%.








North Carolina Unemployment Rate (2007-2017)






North Carolina Real GDP (2012-2017)*



North Carolina Actual Tax Revenue vs. Forecasted Revenue (1990-1991 to 2016-2017)



North Carolina Income Tax Revenue (2012-2016)





North Carolina Gets Top Ten Ranking for Positive Economic Outlook

North Carolina was seventh-best among states for its economic outlook, says the 2018 edition of the American Legislative Exchange Council's Rich States, Poor States. North Carolina didn't reach the top 10 for economic performance, but it was close at 11th. The economic performance index looks at a state's ranking in state gross domestic product, absolute domestic migration, and nonfarm payroll employment. While the economic performance index looks to the past, the economic outlook index looks to the potential impact of tax rates, regulatory burden, and labor policies.








North Carolina State Budget Highlights (2012-2017)

- Over the past five years, North Carolina state budget has grown at an annual rate of 2.3%, generally lower than the rate of population growth plus inflation.
- North Carolina has a budget surplus of \$450 million due to tax reductions; its projected 2018 surplus is \$252 million.
- There were four consecutive revenue surpluses, including \$357.6 million in 2017-18.

North Carolina State Budget Highlights (2012-2017)

- Paid off \$2.75 billion in Federal Unemployment loans.
- Added \$364 million to rainy day fund. Balance at record \$1.8 billion.
- 2017: Businesses saving \$700 million in unemployment taxes per year thanks to early repayment of federal debt.
- Lowered the individual and corporate tax rates and increased the standard deduction for individual income taxes. When reforms are fully implemented by 2017-18 they will have saved taxpayers \$4.7 billion.
- Raised the average teacher salary -- from all fund sources -- to over \$50,000. When the value of health and retirement benefits is included for full-time teachers, value of compensation is more than \$67,000.
- Provided \$35 million for performance-based raises for principals and assistant principals.
- Established pay-as-you-go Capital and Infrastructure Fund effective July 1, 2019.
- Added \$100 million to hurricane disaster recovery, supplementing \$200 million already appropriated by the legislature.
- Creation of a Needs-based Public-School Capital Fund with \$30 million from Education Lottery funds.
- Froze undergraduate tuition for students at all UNC schools who graduate in four years. Capped increases in student fees at 3%. Reduced tuition to \$500 per semester for in-state students at ECSU, UNC-Pembroke and WCU.
- Tripled funding for digital resources and textbooks to \$71 million.




North Carolina Average Teacher Salary

North Carolina Average Teacher Compensation Increase (1997-98 to 2017-18)












North Carolina Opportunity Scholarship Recipients (2015-18)
